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CSW: Topic #2 - Violence Against Women

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Another topic that CSW will address in committee is the harm that is caused by violence, both

sexual and physical, against women. These types of violent activity harm millions of women

annually on the international scale.

According to the World Health Organization (WHO), 1 in 3 women worldwide are subject to

sexual violence in their lifetime, and ¼ of women have been subject to violence in their own

relationships. This figure accounts for all countries and continents. "The prevalence estimates of

lifetime intimate partner violence range from 20% in the Western Pacific, 22% in high-income

countries and Europe, and 25% in the WHO Regions of the Americas to 33% in the WHO African

region, 31% in the WHO Eastern Mediterranean region, and 33% in the WHO South-East Asia

region." No society is free from these deeply upsetting and problematic numbers.

Violence against women can affect both mental and physical health tremendously. 42% of women

who have experienced violence from a partner have resulted in physical injury. Women who are

violated sexually are 1.5 times more likely to contract a sexually transmitted disease. Mental health

is also affected by violence, as studies have shown that violence leads to anxiety, depression, post-

traumatic stress disorder, and an increase in attempted suicide.

Although the international community has begun to address this issue and take steps in the right

direction, much work is still needed to resolve it. The following are some questions to help guide

your research:

How can CSW incentivize state governments and individuals to protect women from

violence?

How can CSW create a resolution that addresses all possible obstructions to the safety of

women?

Are there ways to combat the negative effects of violence against women?
