This week has been like no other at Yeshiva University.

We began this week celebrating the Macs great victory, and we end this week with YU's main campuses closed as a precautionary measure due to the coronavirus. Walking around our campus this week and speaking to the students who are in quarantine has left a deep impression on me. Of course, there is concern, fear and unease about what the future holds, but there is also faith, confidence and resolve

to tackle whatever will come. This challenge has shown the character and resilience of our community. My special thanks are to all of our students, faculty, staff, parents, alumni and lay leadership for your patience, poise, and positivity throughout this entire challenging ordeal.

Particularly during times of great concern, our values guide us and comfort us. Together with our values—the preciousness of life, our learning, our faith and prayers, and our kindness and compassion—we will get through this and emerge even stronger.
