

My Dear Friends,

On the eve of Yom HaShoah, I am standing in Poland about to begin the March of the Living with thousands of students who have gathered from around the world to walk to Auschwitz in the footsteps of those who were killed in the Holocaust. This year, in consideration of the campus unrest throughout the country, the organizers of the event invited me to lead the march with a delegation of university presidents. The message of this moment could not be more clear. The dangers of allowing hate to go unchecked are real.

We are witnessing today an inflection point in Jewish history. Recent protests in support of Hamas have frequently veered into vile antisemitism and on many college campuses we are seeing anti-Jewish hate reach levels previously unimaginable.

In my recent visit to Israel for Pesach, the disturbing events on college campuses were a main topic of conversation. Last week I met with Prime Minister Netanyahu in his office. Together with Israeli Minister of Strategic Affairs, Ron Dermer, we discussed the ways in which the American Jewish community is addressing this rising tide of hate. They emphasized to me the important role Yeshiva University and our students play in standing up for Israel and in combating antisemitism. I have found the same expressions of appreciation from a number of ministers in the Knesset and from President Herzog.

As the flagship Jewish university, we will not leave behind Jewish students who feel threatened on their campuses. Even though our enrollment is full, we have reopened our transfer portal for undergraduate applicants who are seeking our environment of shared values, academic excellence and student safety. We will keep the transfer portal open through an extended deadline of May 31.

But we cannot fit all of the Jewish students in the country in Yeshiva University, and it would not be good for America and our broader society to do so. The Jewish community and all people of moral conscience need to hold these universities accountable to make sure that campuses are taking the necessary measures to prevent intimidation and hate speech. Campuses need to be safe for Jews, not free from Jews.
